Abstract:

Studies in the US have shown that black immigrants have remained at the bottom of the wage ladder and that other groups immigrants have overtaken them over time. The goal of this research is to determine whether a specific group of immigrants displace a group at the bottom of the ladder. We use Israeli data to compare two ethnic groups: Israeli Arabs and Ethiopia immigrants. Israeli Arabs were considered to be the least successful ethnic group in the Israeli labor market until they were displaced by the Ethiopian immigrants. The results of our analysis show that an ethnic group at the bottom of the wage lad can be replaced by another.
