Abstract:

This paper compares the effects of immigration flows on economic outcomes and crime levels to the public opinion about t effects using individual and regional data for Australia. We employ an instrumental variables strategy to account for non-rar location choices of immigrants and find that immigration has no adverse effects on regional unemployment rates, median incomes, or crime levels. This result is in line with the economic effects that people typically expect but does not confirm t public opinion about the contribution of immigration to higher crime levels, suggesting that Australians overestimate the effect immigration on crime.
