Abstract:

Using data from the German Socio-Economic Panel, we examined the impact of social contacts on immigrant occupations status and income. In addition to general social contacts, we also analyzed the effects of bonding (i.e., co-ethnic) and brid (i.e., interethnic) ties on economic outcomes. Results show that general social contacts have a positive effect on the occupational status and, in particular, annual income of immigrants. We also find that bridging ties with Germans lead to h occupational status, but not to increased income. These effects remain visible even when social contacts are measured (a least) one year prior to the economic outcomes, as well as when earlier investments in German human capital are consider Finally, we show that co-ethnic concentration in the region of residence weakly affects economic returns to German langual proficiency and schooling.
