The changing impact of marriage and children on women's labor force participation

In 2004, single women with children were more likely to be working than in 1984, but married women with children—especially young children—were less likely to be doing so; research that overlooks this differential effect of children by marital status draws an incorrect conclusion about the child penalty on women's labor force participation.
