Previous studies found that playfulness/openness of personality trait correlated positively with extreme response style (ERS), the tendency to use frequently extreme alternatives of a rating scale for any specific item content. Tsujimoto (2003) suggested that one's interest in abstracts might mediate the both. In the present study we examined the differences between art and university students in ERS to explore his suggestion. The results showed that there was no significant differences between the both groups on the mean of ERS scores.
