Then one rainy weekend in the country we played a vicious, back-and-forth game of rummy, and when Kay finally edged me by three points, ...(L6-7)


- vicious adj. describes an object, condition or remark that causes great physical or emotional pain:
- a vicious medieval torture instrument
- I've got a vicious headache.
- Make sure you wrap up warmly--there's a vicious wind out there.
- a vicious lie/accusation/rumour

- back and forth adv. 来回地,反复地
- Bitter and cruel remarks flew back and forth between them. 恶言恶语对骂
- a back-and-forth game = a seesaw game like a tug of war
- rummy noun [U] any of various card games in which two or more players try to collect cards which have the same value or whose numbers

follow an ordered series



- edge: win by a narrow margin (口)险胜,以很小 差分击败
- The Mavericks edged the Spurs <u>104-103</u> in Game 3 of the Western Conference Semifinals.
- to edge out
- to edge out the opposing team by 1 point





... I could see that her pleasure in winning was jeopardized by her fear that I'd sulk. (L7-8)

- jeopardize (AmE), jeopardise (BrE) vt.
- to put sth. such as a plan or system in danger of being harmed or damaged:
- She knew that she could jeopardize her future job hunting by failing her exams.
- jeopardy n.
- in jeopardy: in danger of being damaged or destroyed:
- The lives of thousands of fish are in jeopardy as a result of the oil spillage.

I suddenly realized that when the subject had come up before, ...(L17)

- **Come up:** to be mentioned or talked about in conversation:被提到,被讨论
- > What points came up at the meeting?
- > The question never came up in discussion.
- come up to move towards sb:
- > A young girl came up to me and
- come up If a job or opportunity comes up, it becomes available:
- > A position has come up in the department.

... but we've been inhibited from expressing competitiveness. (L20)

- competitiveness. (L20)
 inhibit vt. to prevent sb. from doing sth., or to slow down a process or the growth of sth.:
- Some workers were inhibited (from speaking) by the presence of their superiors.
- This drug inhibits the growth of tumours.
- inhibited adj. be introvert, not confident
- inhibition noun [C or U]

So if by competition you mean imitating the macho way men behave --- no, thanks. (L23-4)

- macho adj. (informal, mainly derogative)
- behaving forcefully or showing no emotion in a way traditionally thought to be typical of a man:大男子主义的
- He's too macho to admit he was hurt when his girlfriend left him.
- I can't stand macho men.

- for the sake of sth / for sth's sake because of, or for the purpose of sth.:
- Let's not disagree for the sake of a few quarrels.
- She is just talking for talking's sake. (= because she likes talking).
- for God's/ Christ's/ goodness'/ heaven's ~
- ◆ for old times' ~ 看在老交情的份上

... there are elements of adolescent insecurity or latent hostility or sexual rivalry in ... (L32-33)

- latent adj. present but needing particular conditions to become active, obvious or completely developed:
- Recent developments in the technology have brought latent certificate forgery out into the open.
- The task of learning a foreign language is to bring out the latent linguistic talents into a linguistic performance.
 (开发潜能)
- latency noun [U] FORMAL

- * Take male <u>kidding around</u>, for instance. I always tell my friend Arthur that he exaggerates so compulsively, he'll even tell people his summerhouse is (L34)
- kid around US INFORMAL to be silly or not serious:
- Stop kidding around and listen to me!
- compulsive adj.
- describes a film, play, sports event, book, etc. that is so interesting or exciting that you do not want to stop watching or reading it:



He <u>come</u>s right back <u>at</u> me: "You're putting on so much weight, ...zip code. (L37-8)

- come at sb to move towards sb. in order to attack them: 攻击
- He came at me with a knife.
- put sth on If people or animals put weight on, they become heavier:
- I'd expected to put weight on when I had sweetmeats, but I didn't.
- He's put on 10 pounds last month because he stops body-maintenance program.
- zip code (US) n [C] postcode

We indulge in so much of this typically male insulting humor that our wives can be forgiven for thinking that ...

- indulge v. [I or T] to allow yourself or another person to have sth. enjoyable, especially more than is good for you: 沉湎于
- The soccer fans indulged their patriotism, waving flags and singing songs.
- We took a deliberate decision to indulge in a little nostalgia.
- After indulging in all the pleasures over the weekend,
 I must get down to some preparation for the final exam.
- indulgence n. indulgent adj.

Just let some guy who's not a close friend try to get away with that kind of one-upmanship. (L 44-45)

- one-upmanship n [U] when sb. does or says sth. in order to prove that they are better than someone else n.高人一等的作风
- □ **get away with** *sth* to succeed in doing sth without being punished: 做成(某坏事或错事而未被发觉或受处分)
- How did he get away with cheating? (得逞)
- □ The thief **get away with** all the precious stones.

- ... but far more often men also experience rivalry as a spur to achievement, as a means of being drawn to perform at the top of our abilities. (L48-49) pur n. [C] encouragement
- The consumer sales' rise would be a spur to even greater effort this season.
- spur v. [T] -rr- to encourage an activity or development or make it happen faster:
- Spurred (on) by her early success, she went on to write four more novels in succession.
- the top noun [S] the limits
- At forty, he was at the top of his profession. (职业 颠峰)

... rather than let the other get the upper hand.

- upper hand: advantage 优势,上风,有利地位
- get / gain / have the upper hand: to be in an advantageous position 占上风
- At last the taller boxer ~ over his rival and knocked him out.

But I overheard them talking after the decision. (L51-52)

- overhear verb [I or T] overheard, overheard to hear what other people are saying unintentionally and without their knowledge:
- □ I overheard a very funny conversation on the bus this morning.
- □ overhear sb. doing /do sth
- □ *I overheard* her telling her teddy not to be so naughty.
- □ We overheard lots of students say that they didn't really like the meal.

You really keep me on my toes.

- □ to be on one's toes: to be cautious/alert 警觉的、 准备行动的
- The barking of the dog keep us on our toes.
- □ Better get/keep on your toes when you coming back at night.

15. "Going up against you isn't any picnic," the other answered. "I know I've got to do my best just to stand a chance." (L54-55)

- be not any picnic= no picnic
- **be no picnic** INFORMAL to be a difficult or unpleasant situation: (口)不是轻松的事
- To most of the Chinese, being a single parent is no picnic.
- **stand a chance** to have a chance of success: 有机 会做...
- She stands a good chance of passing her exam if she works hard.

- 16. ... when a competing publication suddenly folded. (L. 59)
- fold verb [I] (of a business) to close because of failure:
- Many cafeterias fold within the first half of the year.


17. ... men regret pulling off a deal against a competitor, ...(L. 61)

- □ **pull** *sth* **off** INFORMAL to succeed in doing sth. difficult or unexpected: (成功地或艰苦地) 完成,做成,赢得
- □ Liu Xiang **pulls off** the 110-meter hurdle race in 2004 Athens Olympic Games.
- □ He enjoys pulling off a miracle. (一举惊人)
- She pulls off a million-yuan deal with the joint venture.

18. Most men I know get their real kick in sports not from winning but ...(L63-64)

- **kick** n. [C] a strong feeling of excitement and pleasure:
- I get a real kick out of winning the lottery.
- He decided to steal a library from the library, just for kicks.





touch football n.触身式橄榄球



... their lives were riding on the outcome. (L71)

- ride on sth/sb rest on; depend on依靠:
- The farmers' luck now rode on a crop of turnips, since all the other vegetables have been destroyed because of the typhoon.



- ... after losing something like ten sets in a row.
- in a row: in succession, one after another without a break: (□)接连地,连续地
- The CBA team Hongyuan has won the championship three years in a row.
- He has not been here two days in a row.

"Yeah, I suppose so," he said offhandedly. (L78)

- offhand adj.
- unprepared, improvisational 不假思索的,即席的
- an offhand speech, an offhand excuse
- not friendly, slightly rude: 唐突的
- I hope I didn't appear offhand with her it's just that I was in such a hurry.
- offhandedly adverb
 offhandedness noun [U]


"Well, to tell the truth," Frend said, "he is so far off his game, ..." (L80)

- □ to tell (you) the truth to be honest:
- □ *To tell (you) the truth*, I didn't understand a word of what he was saying.
- □ frank adj. honest, sincere and truthful
- □ **To be perfectly frank with you**, I don't think she's up to the job.

- □ **off** prep. below the usual standard, level or rate:低于...,差于...水平
- □ He is off his usual tennis form. 他今天打网球竞技状态失常。
- \square adv., adj. (\square) not normal, crazy
- □ She used to have a lovely voice but I think it's **gone** off recently (= is not as good as it was).
- □ I'm having an **off day** today I just can't seem to do anything right!

- love: point of zero (in the games as tennis)
 (网球等比赛中的)零分
- love all 零比零
- He won the first set six-love.
- The score was 15-0. (fifteen-love)



... that it's a way to disguise their animosity or assert their superiority...(L86)

- animosity: hatred
- tribal animosities
- show no ~ against sb.
 show prejudice against sb.

- □ **assert** verb [T] to do sth. to show that you have power: 维护,主张
- assert one's rights
- She very rarely asserts her **authority** over the children.
- superiority noun [U] → superior adj.
- □ inferiority noun [U] → inferior adj
- a strong sense of inferiority/superiority
