- Ms. Shreve is a founder of the MFA MFA Creative Writing Program at George Mason University, where she continues to teach. She has taught Creative Writing at Princeton University, Columbia University, and the Breadloaf and Bennington writers' conferences. An original board member of the PEN/Faulkner Foundation in Washington, D.C., she served as its president from 1985 to 1990. Her awards and honors include grants from the Lila Wallace Readers Digest Foundation, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Guggenheim Foundation.
- The range of her extraordinarily active career includes writing and delivery of short documentary essays for the Jim Lehrer News Hour. <u>Daughters of the New World</u> was adapted for an NBC television series under the title A Will of Their Own. - Susan Shreve's fiction is marked by its wide range of genre, setting and situation. <u>Daughters of the New World</u> is an unusually fluid and flexible generational saga; <u>Glimmer</u> is a first-person narrative by a modern mixed-race woman, which Shreve published under the pseudonym Annie Waters. All of her work is marked by her lyric gift and by a cool, precise acuity in rendering the nuances of feeling.

Key Words

- 1. My mother's one of those people who tells you everything you've done wrong for thirty years like you do it every day. It <u>drives me crazy</u>.
 - That's the thing that really <u>drives me crazy</u> about my mother. She knows things sitting inside my head same as if I was turned inside out.
 - He doesn't say anything at first and that just about kills me. I'd be fine if he's spank me or something. To say nothing can drive a person crazy.

Difficult Points & Solutions

1. "You can imagine how much I like Mr. Burke".

The true meaning of this sentence is that "you can imagine how much I hate Mr. Burke". This sort of writing style is called irony. It is a type of usually humorous expression in which you say the opposite of what you intend.

2. "Anyway, I got my desk ready to study on since it was stacked with about two million things."

In this sentence, the author use a kind of writing style—hyperbole in order to strengthen the degree of humor and make the language lively. On the other hand, it also coincides with the language of a child.

3. "I began to wonder whether I was plain bad to the core"

"plain" means "completely". The phrase "to the core" also means "completely".

For example, "he is honest to the/very core" 他是个十足的老实人。

4. "Mostly I like myself fine".

When "fine" is used in spoken English, it just means very much. So this sentence means, "At most time I like myself very much" or "At most time I am self-satisfied".

For example, talk fine说得好听, suit sb fine太适合某人

Topic for Discussion



Q: What do you think of the boy in the story? Why did he wish he were dead after he had cheated?

A: The boy in the story is proud for himself to be an honest kid. He has the strong feeling of self-respect so he felt criminal after cheating on the test and felt that his stomach was upside down. Then he told his father everything that he had not planned to say. After knowing what had happened to the boy, his father did not say anything but ask him to call his teacher Mr. Burke. The boy told Mr. Burke exactly what happened, even that he had decided to cheat the night before the test. At last Mr. Burke forgave the boy and allowed him to have another test. It is because the boy is a decent kid that he wished he were dead after he had cheated.

Q: What do you think of cheating on tests?

A: Many students have the experience of cheating on the tests because they want to get good scores. They may say to themselves: It's just a little dishonesty, and just a small thing. However, if you are dishonest in small matters, you will also be dishonest in large matters, and in the end you will be an entirely dishonest man. So we should realize the harm that cheat does to us. If we cheat on tests, we may lose the trust of our teachers and classmates and be expelled from school. Don't make such an excuse for yourself: A little dishonesty is only a small thing", but bear in your mind that "Honesty is the best policy". So as long as we study diligently we are sure to make progress and be successful in tests. Don't turn into the "criminal" because of the stupid tests.
